

Multimodal Communication in the Contemporary Museum: Metafunctional Principles for Cross-modal Analysis

Professor Louise Ravelli (University of New South Wales, Sydney)

Studies of communication have very often been equated with studies of language, and in museums, this too has been the case, with the study of labels and their comprehensibility for visitors being a prime focus. But more recently, studies of communication have come to include multimodal communication, in terms of both the communicative potential of specific modes, such as the visual, and in terms of the co-presence of multiple modes working together in a specific communicative instance. This broad view of communication is essential to a full understanding of the communicative nature of museums: museums do not just convey knowledge, they construe (create) it, through a wide range of resources, including what is selected and placed on display, and by whom; the nature of the displays and language used, the activities that the museum hosts, and even the very building in which a museum is housed. This presentation will introduce Spatial Discourse Analysis (Ravelli and McMurtrie, 2016) as a way of examining the built and virtual environments as part of the communicative potential of museums, demonstrating how the 'same' exhibition means differently according to the environment of its presentation. This will be examined in terms of a social semiotic view of communication, building on Halliday's studies of language (1978, 2014) and Kress and van Leeuwen's studies of images (2021).
